



NEW MAINE TOWNSHIP 1902



First New Maine Town Meeting July 31, 1900

Minutes of the proceedings of the first Town Meeting held in the Town of New Maine in the County of Marshall and State of Minnesota at Martin Tinglum on the 31st day of July 1900. The meeting was called to order by D.B. Bakka. Marlin Tinglum was their chosen to preside as moderator of the meeting.

The moderator at the opening of the meeting stated the business to be transacted and the order of same as follows. That the business to be transacted would be to elect three supervisor, one of whom should be designated on the ballots as Chariman. One Town Clerk, one Treasurer, two Justice of the Peace, two Constables.

On motion it was resolved that the meeting adjourn for one hour from 12:00 to 1:00 o'clock.

Meeting was called to order at one o'clock on motion it was resolved that a poundyard be enacted at SW1/4 Section 20. Halvor Nelson was appointed Pound Master of said town.

The following three places were determined and designated by the voices present as the most public places in said town for the posting up of legal notices on places to wit.

One at Mr. Webster Blewett - SE1/4 Section 25. One at Marlin Tinglum SW 1/4 Section 35. One at Opdahl P.O., Section 19.

The next Annual Town Meeting was ordered to be held at Kittel Lillegaard. The SE1/4 Section 9 Township 157, Range 44 and the same place was designated for holding the next general election in the town.

At five o'clock the polls were closed proclamation these of being made by the Moderator.



NEW MAINE TOWNSHIP

New Maine Township was settled in the nineties and by the turn of the century (January 1, 1901) all of the homestead land in this township had claims filed on them.

The township was organized in 1900. It was named after the historic Battleship Maine that was destroyed in Havana Har-

bor on the night of February 15th, 1898.

The first Town Meeting of the Town of New Maine was held at the home of Martin Tinglum (SW4SW4 Section 35) on the 31st day of July 1900.

The following citizens of the township were elected as the

first officials of this town.

Martin Tinglum, Supervisor, Chairman; Ole C. A. Berg, Supervisor; Clem F. Williams, Supervisor; John S. Rayson, Town Clerk; Kittle Lillegard, Treasurer; Royal Read, Justice of the Peace; Stener Oleson, Justice of the Peace; W. E. Blewett, Constable; Halvor Nelson, Pondmaster; Lars Larson, Constable.

EARLY NEW MAINE SETTLERS
Three families came from Lake Preston, South Dakota. They started out the first of June and got to New Maine Township, Marshall County, on the 30th of June 1899. They came on a wagon train with all their belongings, cattle and sheep too. Some of the sheep had lambs which they had to put in the

wagons.

The trails were rough as in those days there were no roads to follow. Some of the people had to herd the sheep and cattle at night so they would not wander off in somebody's field along

They camped at the Halvor Nelson place in New Maine Township overnight. Mr. and Mrs. Halvor Nelson had come

from Lake Preston only a short time before.

Those who were with the wagon train were: Mr. and Mrs. Stener Blinsmon and their children - Sophia, Oscar, Alma, and Lilly; Mr. Helge Swenson and his children - Anna, Carl, Louis, Julia (Mrs. Ole Haug), Paul Swenson; Mr. and Mrs. Lars Larson and their children - Andrew, Albert, Alfred, Helen and Mary.

After camping the first night they took off for various places in New Maine Township and made their homesteads. Some of those houses are still standing. Some of the people are still liv-

ing in New Maine and some have died.

There were some hard times at first. They all built log houses, there were no roads and water all over so a person had to take shoes off and wade in water to get any place. Some of the boys made stilts and used them to walk with over the water. Stener Blinsmon had one mule and horses that he used to clear his land and later got some oxen to work with.

There were no school houses or churches so they had school in log houses where the children sat around a homemade table

with homemade benches to sit one.

Some of the children had a long distance to walk to school. The people held services in their homes, the pastor drove over with horses and buggy to the services.

So it was not as handy then as it is nowadays for anybody,

but everybody was happy with what they had.

Ben and Inga (Bjorgaard) Bengtson

Bernharth T. Bengtson was born on September 29, 1894 to Joe and Elsie Bengtson on their farm. They had homesteaded four years earlier in Section 10, Marsh Grove Township.

As a second child and only boy in the family he began at an early age to help with chores and farm work which included driving a team of oxen to pull the plow and pull logs out of the woods.

He attended school at Sunnyside School in Marsh Grove and was confirmed into the Lutheran Faith at Westaker Parish of rural Newfolden.

Inga (Bjorgaard) was born January 11, 1896 to John S. and

Annie Bjorgaard at their farm home in Section 15, Alma Township. She started school in District 13, and later attended the Schey School in Section 29, Alma township, where she graduated from the eighth grade.

Ben and Inga met several years later when Iga came to the community to work for her uncle. They were married at War-ren, Minnesota on October 9, 1918. After their marriage they lived for a short time on the second floor of the large house

that Ben's father had built in 1912.

They then purchased 160 acres of land in Section 16, Marsh Grove Township, where they farmed for about ten years. Having no buildings on this land, they rented other farms nearby on which to live. The first place they rented was the Micheal Kitzman farm in Section 15, while their two daughters were born to them, Bernice in 1922 and Darlene in 1923. They lived for a short time on the John Bengtson farm before moving to the Dykman farm in Section 9. Here they hoped to make their home, it had a nice house and a large barn to accommodate their growing herd of cattle, mostly milk cows. They sold cream to the creamery in Newfolden, raised grain, corn and hay for their cattle and horses.

While living on the Dykman farm two sons were born, Leonard in 1927 and Arnold in 1929. Inga helped with the harvesting and haying and the girls would watch their baby brother in

a shady spot in the meadow nearby.

About 1930 the Dykman farm was sold and the family moved to New Maine Township where they rented the Halbert Amundson farm in Section 5. Ben also bought 160 acres in Section 30, of New Maine Township. This land being mostly timber, Ben, whenever possible would be cutting trees and clearing land.

During the depression years, Ben cut and sold wood and hired out to other farmers to earn extra cash. Sometimes he would shock his own grain at night by moonlight, after spend-

ing the day working for others.

Two more sons were born; Vernon in 1932 and Lloyd in 1936. In the fall of 1936, they moved to their own farm in Sec-

tion 30 where they spent the rest of their lives.

In the spring of 1937, Inga was stricken with pneumonia, which before penicillin, was a very serious disease. On May 9, 1937 Inga died, leaving Ben to raise six children, the oldest 15 and the youngest 1 year old.

Heartsick and grief-stricken though he was, Ben never gave up. He kept working on clearing the land, selling the wood he cut, raising some grain, keeping a large herd of cattle, and working for wages whenever work was available. He was able to keep the children together and raise them to maturity.

Ben was still actively engaged in farming at the time of his death on April 8, 1974 at the age of 79. Then owning 240 acres in Section 30 of New Maine Township. Submitted by Mrs. Nor-

Oscar and Anna (Lee) Blinsmon
Oscar Blinsmon was born in Trent, South Dakota, May 21, 1890 to Mr. and Mrs. Stener Blinsmon. They came to New Maine Township by wagon train on June 30, 1898. Oscar was eight years old at the time. The family lived on a farm in New Maine for a number of years. Oscar worked on the Soo Line Railroad as a section laborer for 43 years, until his retirement in 1955. In the early years his wages were fifteen cents an hour. He worked a ten hour day for \$1.50.

We lived on 40 acres of land in New Maine where Oscar had to walk ten miles each day. We lived on those 40 acres every

summer for a number of years.
On December 19, 1914, he married Anna L. Lee (better known as Julia). We were blessed with six children (one boy died in infancy). The names of our children are: Mrs. Nestor Austin (Alice), has two children, Newell of Seattle and Gary living at home in Puyallup, Washington; Mrs. Dale Magner (Jeanette) has three children, Robert at home, Darrell lives in Denver, Colorado; Mrs. Daryl Johnson (Julia) lives in East Grand Forks, Minnesota and has an adopted girl and boy of

their own; Orville Blinsmon is deceased, he had one boy and four girls; Ronald Blinsmon lives in Lacy Washington, he has one girl; Mrs. Dave Goucher (Joy Ann) lives in Renton and has two boys; Mrs. Lee Medicus (Bonnie) lives in Puyallup, Washington and has two girls; Mrs. Jody Fairman (Debbie) lives in Federal Way, Washington, Laurie lives with her mother; Clayton Blinsmon lives in Newfolden and has three children; Freddie Blinsmon lives in Greenbush, Minnesota; Mrs. Larry Ekman (Sharon) lives in Thief River Falls, Minnesota and has one girl, Leslie, at home; Mrs. Melvin Edlund (Evelyn) lives in Puyallup, Washington and has twins, Joel and Joelle, and Danny Lee.

We have 12 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren. Sub-

Stener and Anna (Tallum) Blinsmon

Stener Blinsmon was born on February 23, 1866 in Iowa. He is the son of Ole Blinsmon and Sonive Blinsmon. He came to Marshall County in 1899 to New Maine Township, Section 17. He worked as a railroad section foreman.

He married Anna Tollum in 1887. She was born March 13, 1864 in Norway, she is the daughter of Halvor and Anna Tol-

lum. She came to Marshall County in 1900.

Stener and Anna had five children, namely: Sophie (Mrs. Nelson), Oscar, Alma (Mrs. Lee), Lilly (Mrs. Lee), and Agnes (Mrs. Kyjava) all of Newfolden, Minnesota.

Stener was a member of the board of supervisors for New Maine Township from 1901 and for several years thereafter.

Oscar Blinsmon states: "It took one month for us and two other families to get here from Kingsbury County of South Dakota, to Marshall County and New Maine Township. There were three covered wagons, forty head of cattle, thirty head of sheep, and a few horses."

Stener Blinsmon died on December 6, 1942 and Anna Blinsmon died on February 28, 1906. Both of them are buried in New Maine Township. Submitted by Mrs. Oscar Blinsmon

Andrew and Gertrude (Bakke) Bring

Andrew Bring was born in Sweden and came to New Maine Township in 1881, where he homesteaded. He married Gertrude Bakke, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Iver Bakke from Norway. She was born in Faarvang, Norway on October 4, 1860 and passed away December 11, 1935 at the age of 75 years. She is buried in the Augustana Cemetery east of Newfolden. Andrew died in June of 1900 and is buried in Section

31 in New Maine Township.

They had seven children born to them: Matilda was born April 30, 1884. She was married to Pete Dorn of southern Minnesota. She passed away at the age of 66 on November 20, 1950. Inga was born May 2, 1890 and married George Sholy of Fairdale, North Dakota. She is 85 years old and living in Nekoma, North Dakota. Martha was born June 9, 1893 and died January 8, 1908. August was born May 18, 1895, he married Alma Tunheim of Newfolden. He was killed by a freight train at the age of 48, on October 27, 1943. Gust was born on November 3, 1896 and married Louise Haarstad of Marsh Grove Township. He is now 78 years old and living in West Valley Township. John was born July 1, 1898 and died in August 1925. Ellen was born March 12, 1900. She married Paul Vinjie of West Valley, he died and she married Morris Olson of New Solum Township, he died and she married Joel Wilson of Minneapolis, Minnesota. Ellen died at the age of 65 years, April 30, 1965. The deceased children are buried in the Augustana Cemetery east of Newfolden. Submitted by the Bring Family

Johan and Botilda Dufke

Johan Dufke was born in 1813. He married Botilda Nielson at Helsvig or Skand Sweden. They immigrated to the United States around 1870 or 1871, first settling in Cottage Grove, Minnesotz then later coming to Newfolden.

Johan and Botilda had three children: John Lofstrom born in 1864 in Valby Kristanstad Sweden; Sophie Parson or Pearson; and William S. Dufke born in 1874 or 1879.

Botilda made her own dyes and wove colorful rugs. She was reputed to have been a midwife in the Royal family in Sweden before coming here. It's an old time story though not verified.

Sophie moved to Montana, married a Gunderson and started the town of Forsyth.

John Lofstrom went to Utah and was a tailor and was killed

at Cripple Creek.

William Dufke married Augusta Marie Erickson and they moved to Montana for a while where he had a plumbing shop, later they came back to the homestead. They had three children: Florence, Emily and Leona.

Johan Dufke died on August 2, 1920. William Dufke died during the flu epidemic of 1918. Submitted by Mrs. Leonard

Ole T. and Julia (Swenson) Haug

Ole T. Haug, the father of Mrs. Herbert Stengrim, Route 1, Warren, Minnesota, was born in Numedahl, Norway, June 5, 1872, the son of Tov and Joran Saghaug. In 1893 he came to Oslo, Minnesota, where some of his brothers had come before him. He worked there for a while then went to New Maine Township where he filed on a homestead in Section 21; he cleared away trees and brush and built a house. The nearest town was Argyle and when he went for supplies it took a full day. He used to stop to feed and rest the horses and eat some lunch, which was soda crackers and polse (summer sausage), by the river bend north of where Inar Stranquist now lives.

In 1901 he married Julia Swenson, who was born in Numedahl, Norway, May 4, 1877, the daughter of Helge and Gro Swenson. The Swensons came to Mitchell, South Dakota about 1881. Then in June 1899, they and two other families left by covered wagons with all their belongings, cats, dogs, sheep and cattle (which they had to take turns chasing and herding along the way). The trip took over a month as there were no roads to follow and the few trails there were rugged and rough. June 30th they arrived at the Halvor Nelson home in New Maine Township. There were trees and brush and it rained a lot and, of course, the mosquitoes, what a change compared to the dry South Dakota prairies. Each family took off for various places in New Maine Township and made their homesteads.

Mr. and Mrs. Ole T. Haug lived on their homestead until 1910 when they decided to go to Bergland Ontario, Canada to cut logs in the woods as the wages there were better. In 1912 they returned to the farm in New Maine but, it was hard to make a living with just a few acres of grain and a few cows. When he came from Norway, be brought his violin along but sold it to a bachelor, Gilbert Nelson, because he needed the money. In a few years he came back with it in small pieces all in a shoe box. It had been handled a little rough and had come unglued and broken. He whittled the missing pieces with his pocket knife and got it all glued back together so that it looked

just like new. A son, Paul, has the violin now.

In 1916 Ole Haug took off for Hoople, North Dakota with one horse and a buggy and bought a farm from his brother-in-law and sister. When he returned, they had an auction sale and with the family belongings in a wagon pulled by a team of horses, he, along with the oldest son, Helmer, about 14 years old, made the trip to the farm in North Dakota. The rest of the family went by train. In 1928 they moved to a better farm at

Auburn, a village by Grafton, North Dakota, which they farmed until they retired and spent the rest of their lives. Sam Swenson, a brother of Mrs. Haug, along with a friend

stayed and worked until fall when the two young men came to Minnesota from South Dakota on their bicycles. Later, Sam, with the help of his sister, started the Opdahl post office that they took care of until the town of Newfolden was founded.

Ten children were born to the Haugs, two of which passed away when they were infants and are buried at the Opdahl cemetery. There was no church so when a minister was in the community they gathered at the homes and baptized several children at a time. They also had Sunday services in the homes and later in school houses when some were built.

Mr. Haug was 79 years old when he died and she was 84 years old at the time of her death. The children who survive

are: Gina, a daughter who lives in Grafton; Helmer and Lewis, who are retired but live on their farms by Grafton; Otto and Paul, who farm near Grafton; Edwin, who also lives on a farm near Grafton; Oscar, in a nursing home at Devils Lake, North Dakota, and Mrs. Herbert (Annie) Stengrim who has lived on the county seat Johnson farm in Foldahl Township since 1941. The Stengrims were married in 1940.

The Stengrims have six children, two of which live in Marshall County. Roy lives near Newfolden; Arlyn in Warren; Marvin in Grafton, North Dakota; Orris, Thief River Falls; Glen, Pembina, North Dakota; and Mrs. Ralph (Jean) Edgar, whose husband is presently stationed in Florida but will be moving back to Thief River Falls in the fall; and nine grand-

Knute K. and Anne C. Haugen
Grandparents of Lloyd C. Larson

Knute K. Haugen was born in Nore, Numedal, Norway on April 25, 1862, to Knute and Joran Haugen. He came to

America in 1893 settling at Hetland, South Dakota.

Anne Carlson was born April 20, 1864 in Numedal, Norway

and came to Lake Preston, South Dakota in 1892.

Knute and Anne had been engaged to be married in Norway and were married in Kingsbury County, South Dakota on November 24, 1894. They farmed near Hetland for six years and their two children were born there, Gena on September 6, 1895 and Knute Jr. on April 4, 1897.

In 1900 they migrated by covered wagon to New Maine Township, homesteading here in Section 10, five miles north of Newfolden. Their first house was built of logs and in just a few years they had prospered enough to build a frame house and

Their children attended school in District 100 in New Maine. Knute Jr. was an avid hunter and trapper and an amateur photographer. He also raised skunks for their pelts. He died while serving in the army during World War I, December

Gena married Alfred Larson, they had three children, Melvin, Lloyd, and Della. Alfred and Gena moved onto the Haugen homestead when Haugens bought a farm one mile north of

Newfolden and moved there in 1923.

Haugens were a very thrifty but generous couple. During the depression many local people banked with Knute and borrowed money from him. He generously supported the Mission Church. He enjoyed church sermons especially when they spoke Norwegian. Anne could speak English before she came to America and is remembered for her cheerfulness and always smiling face.

They moved into Newfolden in 1943, having sold their farm to Kenneth Moens. Knute was active and about until shortly before his death on May 17, 1953 at the age of 91. Anne spent her remaining years with her daughter Gena in Minneapolis. She died at the age of 95 on April 6, 1960. Knute, Anne and Knute Jr. are all buried in the Opdahl Cemetery. Submitted by

Ole and Sigri (Ulberg) Knudtson Ole Knudtson, who was born at Skurdalen, Norway, on March 19, 1846, was the son of Knudt and Gurro Nostedokken. He married Sigri Pedersdatter Ulberg in 1870 at the Opdahl Church, Numedal, Norway. They came to New Maine Township in 1901 from South Dakota. Their homestead was in Section 35, New Maine Township. They were members of the Lutheran Church and very active in church work. Nine children were born: Knudt Knudtson, died at Newfolden in 1941, Guro (Mrs. Halvor Blinsmon) died in 1905, Sigri (Mrs. John Swenning), Ole and Peder died as children in Norway, Peder died in South Dakota in 1901, Anna (lived in Newfolden), Ole Jr. died at sea coming to America, Olaf, a veteran of World War I died at Minneapolis, Minnesota in 1925

Ole Knudtson died December 23, 1928 and his wife Sigri on April 1, 1910. They are both buried at the Augustana Čemetery, east of Newfolden. Submitted by the Knudtson Family

Kittel and Helvig Knutson

Kittel Knutson was born February 15, 1850 near Opdahl, Numedal, Norway. His wife Helvig was born May 10, 1851 in Norway. They came to America and settled near Hetland, South Dakota. Five children were born; Knudt, Edvard, Julia, Samuel and Tillie. After Julia got married and moved to New Maine Township, her dad came up to visit her and liked the country so well, he decided to move here, too. He settled on the east one half of southeast one fourth of Section 20, in New Maine Township. The house he built here was very much the same style as the house he had built in South Dakota. His grandson, Chester, still lives in this house, however, it has been moved further south from the original building site. The Kittel Knutsons had the Opdahl Post Office in their home. Many of the school teachers boarded in their home.

Kittel Knudson died August 15, 1916. His wife Helvig died in August of 1936. Both are buried in the Opdahl cemetery in

New Maine Township.

Kittel had a brother, Ole who also lived here. Ole was a preacher and would go to the homes and hold sermons.

Helvig's sister, Mrs. Lars Larson, also lived in New Maine Township. Edvard Knutson lived with his folks on the old homestead until about 1928 when Julia, Mrs. Halvor Nelson, and her family came to live with Helvig. Edvard and Knute moved to Leonard, Minnesota. Samuel to Willmar, Minnesota and Tillie to Washington, D.C.

Julia (Mrs. Halvor Nelson) had settled in New Maine several years before. Julia had eight children: Helen, Nels, Chester, Leander, Edward, Harlen, Bernice and Burnelle. After Kittel had died and her brother Ed had moved to Leonard, Minnesota, Julia and her family lived with her mother Helvig on the old Knutson home place. Julia was born December 4, 1880 and died November 15, 1944.

Knudt was born in South Dakota on May 2, 1873 and died at Clearbrook, Minnesota July 31, 1949. He and his wife, Carrie had two children: Clara (Mrs. Gust Johnson) and Lyle. They settled on Section 19, New Maine Township and later moved to Clearbrook, Minnesota where they lived until they

Edvard was born March 24, 1875 and died July 31, 1949. He and his wife, Minnie (who was a school teacher) had two children: Edna (Mrs. Lamoine Forbragd) who lives at Leonard, Minnesota and a son, Arthur who died at the age of one year. Edvard lived in New Maine until 1928 when he moved to Leonard. Ed and his brothers used to do a lot of well drilling.

Samuel was born January 14, 1884 and died January 16, 1962. He married Inez Sjogren in 1918. She died on March 24, 1919. Later Sam moved to Willmar, Minnesota. He remarried. He and his wife, Amelia had 6 children, Hilmer, Laurel,

Mavis, Dolores, Harold and Joyce.

Tilla (Tillie or Evelyn) Knutson was born August 21, 1886.

She worked at the Marshall County Court House before her marriage to Carlos Martyn. After her husband's death in 1925 she lived in New York and Stanford, Connecticut where she worked in real estate. She spent summers in Florida and Georgia. She was a manager of hardware at the Lansburgh Department Store in Washington, D.C. She had no children but she helped raise two nieces. She knew Clare Boothe Luce personally and also Sutzen Borghum. She loved to paint scenery and used to do well when she exhibited at the art shows. She is now living at a rest home in Clearbrook, Minnesota. Submitted by Joan Roppe

Hans I. and Anna (Lunde) Korgen

Hans Iverson Korgen and Anna Marie Lunde were married in Norway and migrated to America from Bardu, a settlement north of the Artic Circle, in 1899 and came to live with the Johannes Lokstad family. Mr. Lokstad and Mr. Korgen were brothers. The route from Norway took them to England, then to Montreal and to Sault Saint Marie and finally to Holt, Minnesota. The Korgens lived with the Lokstads until the spring of 1901 when they moved to their homestead in New Maine Township. The last available homestead in the Township.

There were seven children in the Korgen family. Ben and Emily were born in Norway. Ben is now living in Duluth, Minnesota where he is retired after a long period of employment at the Steel Plant where he supervised the mechanical maintenance division. He is married to the former Louise Slattum of New Maine Township and they have three children. Howard, who was an industrial engineer at the Steel Plant for a period of 20 years, now has his own business in Joliet, Illinois. Benjamin, Jr. who recently earned a Doctor's Degree in oceanography, taught in this field at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Albert and Clara (Lee) Larson
Albert Larson was born August 2, 1887 near Hetland, South Dakota. His parents were Lars and Gunhilde Larson. Albert came to New Maine Township with his parents, when he was 12 years old. They came with two other families, Swensons and Blinsmons, in covered wagons.

Albert attended school in an old log house where Lavine Rokke lived. They could only speak Norwegian so they had to learn to speak English. He homesteaded in New Maine Town-

ship in Section 11 in about 1910.

For a living, Albert did a lot of hunting and trapping and also walked many miles and played at dances. There were no roads so he had to walk through swamps and water. They would play all night and walk back home in the morning. He was a good violin player.

In 1916 he married Clara Lee. They lived on his homestead until about 1935 and then lived on various places in New Maine Township. They moved to Section 17 where they farmed and trapped wolves for a living. They had to go seven miles to do their trading. Their only transportation was a pair of mules. During the depression years they held bowery dances and cut cordwood to make their living.

They raised four children: Gladys (Mrs. Oscar Erickson), Warren, Minnesota, Laura (Mrs. Roy Roppe), Newfolden, Harriet (Mrs. Raymond Jorgenson), Warren, Minnesota and

Lester Larson of Viking.

Albert and Clara moved to the Village of Newfolden in 1965 where they have since resided. Submitted by Albert Larson Family

Alfred S. and Gena (Haugen) Larson

Alfred S. Larson was born to Lars and Gunhild Larson at Hetland, South Dakota on January 4, 1892. The youngest of nine children. When he was seven years old his family migrated by covered wagon to New Maine Township homesteading there on Section 9 in 1899.

He grew up there and went to the Lavina Rokke school first and later in School District 100. As a boy he learned to play the violin as had his older brothers Andrew and Albert. His whole family was interested in music. They formed a dance orchestra and would often walk many miles to play for dances. His cousins Sam, Ed and Knute Knutson were a part of this

Alfred was interested in photography as evidenced by the many pictures taken and developed by him. The glass plates used as negatives at that time are still clear and produce good

He served with the Army Medical Corps in France during World War I.

Alfred married Gena Haugen, the daughter of Knute and Anne Haugen. They had three children, Melvin, Lloyd and Della. They lived for a few years on the Larson homestead and moved in 1923 to the Haugen farmstead, farming and raising their children there.

Farming was not very profitable during the thirties, Alfred trapped wolves and hunted wild game to feed his family. Gena worked hard helping with chores, washing clothes by hand, sewing clothes and cooking for her family. Melvin and Lloyd cut wood for cooking and heating and some for selling.

Alfred and Gena were divorced in 1945 and Gena went to live with their daughter, Della, in Minneapolis. Alfred sold his farm in 1950 and bought an 80 acre farm one-half mile to the

People from all over the county visited with him each year when they drove past his house to pick blueberries in the Hanson swamp. Submitted by Donnis Larson

Andrew and Hannah (Sjogren) Larson

Andrew Larson was one year old when his parents, Lars and Gunhild emigrated from Norway to South Dakota. In 1899 the Larson's moved to New Maine Township by covered wagon.

Andrew worked out after coming here, mostly on the railroad. He was a good musician, self taught and could play various instruments, usually the violin. He preserved much history with his camera, it is said he was never without it.

He married Hannah Sjogren in 1915 and six children were born to them, Richard, Robert, Evelyn, Arnold, Stanley and Shirley. Robert died from diphtheria in 1919 at the age of two years, and Evelyn in an automobile accident in 1937.

Hannah was a good seamstress and sewed clothes and patched for her own family as well as for others who were less fortunate than they during the depression for at least Andrew had a job.

Andrew retired from the railroad in 1949 after over 45 years as section foreman in Karlstad, Strandquist, and Newfolden. After his retirement he and Hannah lived in Section 18, New Maine Township until his death in 1956.

Hannah then moved into Newfolden, she was well known in all the communities around here and her interest in people is evidenced by her scrapbooks. They contain many pictures and facts with newspaper clippings dating back as far as 1915. She also loved picnics and would work for days preparing for one and the more people that came just made it more of a success.

She spent much of her last years doing fancywork, making quilts, pillows and many lovely things. She died in May of 1973 and both her and Andrew are buried in the Opdahl cemetery.

Their son Arnold married Vernice Aune, Stanley married Sandra Garfve, and Shirley married Ray Anderson. Richard is still single and lives in New Maine Township. Submitted by Richard Larger.

Lars and Gunhild (Tanberg) Larson

In 1882 Lars and Gunhild Larson and their four children, Lars Jr., Tilla, Sarah and Andrew left their home at Opdahl, Numedal, Norway for America.

They arrived at New York on the Fourth of July and thought it quite a noisy place with all the firecrackers banging

and boat whistles blowing.

They settled near Hetland, South Dakota where five more children were born, Knute, Marie, Albert, Helen and Alfred. They lived in a sod house and had a few cows and some sheep. They added to their income by market hunting and working for neighbors.

A shortage of heating fuel made living there difficult, the kids would pick buffalo and cow chips to burn. One story has it that when the train went through, the kids would throw stones at the train crew to get them to throw coal at them in return. Also the lake where they watered their stock dried up.

Lars Jr. went to northwestern Minnesota and sent back reports of a country full of wood, water and grass. In 1899 three families, Larsons, Swensons and Blinsmons left for Minnesota together with their cattle, horses and sheep. After about a month's time and a run in or two with irate farmers, they arrived in New Maine Township on the 30th of June.

The Larsons settled on the southwest one fourth of Section 9 or so they thought until the section lines were surveyed and they found out the buildings were on the wrong side of the sec-

tion line.

Both Lars and Gunhild were over 50 years old when they migrated here. She had insisted on bringing her sheep along from South Dakota against the wishes of some of the others and she sheared them herself so she would have wool for socks, mittens and other wool clothes for her family.

Their son Knute died in 1911 and one by one the rest of the children left to make their own homes. Lars Sr. died in 1914 and Gunhild died in 1929 at the age of 81. All are buried in the Opdahl Cemetery in New Maine Township. Submitted by Don-

Lloyd C. and Donnis Y. (Bolstad)

Larson

Lloyd C. Larson, the son of Alfred and Gena Larson was born December 22, 1921 in Section 9, New Maine Township in the log house his Grandfather Larson had built on his homestead in 1899. The second of three children. He grew up on the homestead of his other grandparents in Section 10, the Knute K. Haugens.

He attended the Blackberg School, with Freda Blackberg as

the teacher.

As a boy he thought this must be the most wonderful place in the world to live, with its changing seasons, there was always something interesting to look forward to. Spring meant gophers and woodchucks to hunt or trap. Best of all school would be out. Summers were spent herding cattle and haying. Along with many Sunday picnics and family get-togethers. Fall was a joy for soon hunting and trapping seasons would open. Winter was tolerable due to radio, Amos 'n Andy, Little Orphan Annie, Buck Rogers and The Green Hornet. Sundays found the neighbor kids going on skis to visit one another in spite of all the chores to be done first.

He earned his spending money by trapping mink, weasels and skunks. As a youth Lloyd was in the CCC camp at Bena, Minnesota, planting trees, earning \$30 dollars a month and board and room. He also worked for Alfred Tunheim, helping

stucco houses.

Lloyd served three years in the Army as a Medic during World War II in India and Burma. When he was discharged he bought a farm next to his Dad's place, farming here until mov-

ing to Minneapolis in 1952.

Lloyd married Donnis Bolstad on Ocober 2, 1954. They made their home in Minneapolis where Lloyd was employed as a welder until 1966 when they moved back to New Maine on their present farm home in Section 15.

Lloyd and Donnis have eight children, Nancy, Robert,

Bryan, Ellen, David, Dawn, Lawrence and Darren.

Nancy graduated from Northland College in Thief River Falls in 1975, and was married to Robert Kolkman on April 21, 1975. They live at Montevideo. Robert graduated from high school in 1975. Bryan, Ellen, David and Dawn attend school in Newfolden. Larry and Darren are not yet school age. Submitted by Donnis Larson

John and Hannah (Olson) Lee

My mother, Hannah Olson Lee and my father, John Lee, were born in Tronheim, Norway. Dad was born in 1873 and mom in 1879. Dad came to the United States when he was 19 years old. He worked on farms around Grand Forks, North Dakota. Then later he came to where Oslo now is located.

My mother came with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Olson, when she was eight years old. They settled by Alvarado,

Minnesota in Marshall County.

Mother and dad were married in Warren, Minnesota in 1896. They both worked on farms there for many years. In 1902 they decided to move to New Maine Township in Marshall County. They farmed there and in the fall dad went out and did harvest and threshing around Argyle, Minnesota and Alvarado.

They had nine children, three girls and six boys: Anna Lee Blinsmon, Clara Lee Larson, Hjalmer Lee, Alfred Lee — deceased (all of Newfolden, Minnesota), Ingval Lee — deceased, Johnnie Lee who lives in Quinze, Oregon, Henry Lee — deceased, Melvin Lee who lives in Thief River Falls, Minnesota, and Myrtle Lee Lund who lives in Eureka, Montana.

My folks lived on the farm from 1902 until they moved to the village of Newfolden, where they lived until dad died in August of 1958. Mom went to live with Mr. and Mrs. Roy Lund. She is now 96 years old and stays at a home in Warren, Minnesota.

They moved from Oslo in 1902 to New Maine Township in 'Marshall County. They had two wagons with their household goods and they had two cows tied behind the wagons. No roads and then it became wet and we got stuck with the wagons close to where Gotfred Olson had his farm. Lots of water all over.

On the Fourth of July we all went to Newfolden to celebrate. We drove with oxen part of the way, then they put the oxen in an empty barn and we walked the rest of the way. We went to a ballgame close to where Willis Bjorgaard has his home.

Mother, Clara, and I did the milking and the cattle were on the loose, we had to hunt them down and get them home for milking. No fences as yet at that time.

So living was not as easy as it is nowadays. We had to work both in the house and help outside with chores and haying, raked hay with two oxen most of the time. We worked out for other people for 50 cents a week and we thought it was great.

John Lee was on the school board in New Maine Township and in Newfolden Village. He was on the town board too. We had no school house so they got together and built a school house in Section 23, New Maine Township. There were only five to seven pupils in school. We walked 1½ miles to school. Our first school teacher was Mary Hevle. Hans Korgen was one of our closest neighbors. Nels Johnson and family, Mr. and Mrs. Ole Calru, and Ole Knutson and family were also some of our neighbors. Helge and Olive (Lee) Lindquist

Helge Thorwald Lindquist, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nels Lindquist and Olive Katherine Lee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam O. Lee were married in Newfolden on August 4, 1932 by Rev. G. P. Ronholm. They lived in the Lindquist Cafe in Newfolden for a few months and in March, 1933 they moved to the north-east one quarter of Section 30, New Maine Township which they purchased from the State of Minnesota and were engaged in dairy and grain farming. Later they purchased the southeast one fourth-southeast one fourth Section 18, New Maine Township.

Helge built and wired all his own buildings, cleared land etc. He was clerk of the town board, township assessor for many years, and served on various township and village boards. He

also served as clerk of the school board.

In 1950 Helge started working for the Marshall County Agricultural Department measuring beets, wheat, and ditches. Later being county grain storage supervisor. In 1958 they moved to the City of Warren where Helge continued as storage supervisor and his wife began working in the ASCS office where she worked for 15 years. Their farm was sold to Donald C. Peterson of Lancaster in 1964.

They have three children, Mrs. Robert (Helen) Hjelle of East Grand Forks, Minnesota, Mrs. Charles (Marjorie) Kvern of Minneapolis, Minnesota and David of Warren, and seven

grandchildren.

Nels and Hilda (Wallin) Lindquist

Nels and Hilda Lindquist immigrated to America from Malmo, Sweden in May of 1912, with their sons Gunnar Nels, age 11 and Helge Thorwald, age 7. When Nels got off the train in Newfolden, he stood on the wooden sidewalk and said, "Where is the town?" They had lived in a large, modern city where Nels had been a bricklayer and Hilda a tailor.

In 1914 they purchased the northeast one fourth of Section 30 in New Maine Township, four miles northwest of Newfolden. The land was not improved so it had to be cleared before buildings could be built, including a two story, square house,

granary, log barn, shed etc.

The boys attended Goodwill Rural School, District #140 which was one-half mile away. The children took turns standing by a pot-bellied wood stove to keep warm. The sandwiches

were often frozen when noon-time came.

In 1926 they purchased the Victor Nelson Confectionery in Newfolden which Helge and his mother managed for six years while Gunnar and his father farmed. By this time they also farmed the west half of Section 18, New Maine Township and the northeast one fourth Section 24, West Valley Township, seven miles northwest of Newfolden.

In April of 1929 Gunnar married Adella Johnson, they were

the parents of two boys and two girls.

In August of 1932, Helge married Olive Lee and they were the parents of two girls and one boy

Nels Lindquist died April 17, 1960 at the age of 88 years.

Hilda Lindquist died July 14, 1967 and was 88 years old. Gunnar died December 26, 1973 at 72 years of age and Helge died February 25, 1974 at 68 years of age. Submitted by Mrs. Helge

Halvor O. and Julia (Knutson) Nelson

Halvor O. Nelson was born September 8, 1868 at Numedahl, Norway; the son of Nels and Margret Nelson. He came to America in 1889, settling near Atkinson, South Dakota. His first wife died. On September 4, 1897 he was married to Julia Knutson. They came to Marshall County and filed for a homestead in the southwest one quarter of Section 20, New Maine Township. Two children were born in New Maine Township, Helen and Nels. In the summer of 1902, they moved to the town of Rainy, Canada, later to Pitt, Minnesota. The other six children who were born here were: Chester, Leander, Edward, Harlen, Bernice, and Burnelle. They moved to North Dakota and also lived near Leonard, Minnesota. They returned to New Maine Township, Section 20 and lived on the Kittel Knutson homestead (which was Julia's parents) until Halvor died on May 28, 1942. His wife Julia was born in South Dakota on December 4, 1880 and died on November 15, 1944. Both are buried at the Opdahl Cemetery. The Kittel Knutsons' had a post office in their home, which was called the Opdahl Post Office. Opdahl was the name of the place in Norway where they were from. Halvor had two brothers, Knute and Lars, and a sister, Gertrude, who came to America. Knute lived with Halvor in New Maine Township and died there in 1900 or 1901. Halvor has three sons living in Marshall County; Chester lives on the old homestead, Nels lives in Section 28 and Edward in the Village of Newfolden. Nels C. and Bertina (Strand) Nelson

Nels Conrad Nelson was born May 20, 1900 in Section 20, New Maine Township. He is the son of Halvor and Julia Nelson. When he was two years old they moved to Rainy, Canada and then to Pitt, Minnesota. Where they lived until 1914. Later they moved to North Dakota and near Clearbrook and Leonard, Minnesota. They moved back to New Maine Township in 1927. He married Bertina Strand on November 25, 1927. They lived near Grafton, North Dakota until 1933 when they bought 80 acres in Section 28 of New Maine Township. They lived here until 1945 when they moved to the Halvor Nelson home. In 1947 they bought 160 acres in northwest one fourth of Section 28 and have lived there since that time. Their youngest son, Jerome, bought their farm, less a few acres, and lives in the same Section. They have eight children, namely: Marvin, Deloris (Mrs. Albin Holton), Joan (Mrs. Wallace Roppe), Marian (Mrs. Arnold Peterson), Janice (Mrs. William Olson), Vernon, Gary, and Jerome. Charles and Amelia (Lindstad) Nilson

In the year 1901 a young man of just 15 years left his birthplace at Hov in Ysby, Halland Sweden. Charles said "Goodbye" to his mother, sister, and his brother Adolf. The day Charles left home he had a dream of someday owning a farm of his own, many Swedes had already done this and the 'America" fever was felt in many homes, as young people left Sweden. On the 27th of April Charles arrived in Liverpool, England, the place so many immigrants have had as their starting place to fulfill their hopes of a better life in the United States of America. The ship that carried Charles on his long journey was named "Savia," and it was a long, hard trip that lasted almost two weeks. The day Charles set foot on American soil in New York he became 16 years, May 10, 1901

From New York the journey continued by train to Chicago, Illinois, where an uncle met Charles, and there began the adjusting to the American way of life and learning to speak and read the language. Uncle Olaf sent Charles to vocational college and for a few years afterwards Charles worked at vari-

ous and different jobs.

In the course of events Charles and his Uncle Olaf came to live in Grand Forks, North Dakota and somewhere around 1907 Charles met Amelia Linstad from Adams, North Dakota. They were married on December 25, 1908.

On March 28th, 1912 they had a daughter born to them and they named her Marie. The following year a son was born to

them and they named him Edwin.

In 1915 they decided to homestead in Roseau, Minnesota. Another daughter was born to Charles and Amelia and they named her Minnie. A decision was made to leave Roseau and go to Newfolden and buy a farm in New Maine Township so the children would have it nearer to school. Four more children were born to the Nilsons, on March 14th, 1922 a daughter named Ivadell, on December 27th, 1924 a daughter named Lorraine and on November 11th, 1926 one more daughter was born and she was named Beulah. One more son was born to them, a boy named Robert on October 28th, 1929.

The farm that was purchased in 1919 became the answer to the dream of that young man that left Sweden in 1901. At the edge of the farm was a school, Goodwill District #0140, and here the Nilson children could go to school and come home for a hot dinner at noon-time, though it was a treat to take a bucket lunch to school once in awhile. Mrs. Nilson was the school's janitor for many years. The school was finally surrounded by Mr. Nilson's farm land, as he developed and extended the acreage of his farm.

While the Nilsons were busy developing and improving the farm, they experienced many hardships, heartaches, and no end to hard work; such was the lot of all the early pioneer settlers. Four more children were born to the Nilsons, on March 14th, 1922 a daughter named Ivadell, on December 27th, 1924 a daughter named Lorraine, and on November 11th, 1926 one more daughter was born and she was named Beulah. After these three girls a son was born and he was named Robert, he

was born on October 28th, 1929.

During the years of raising a family and enlarging the farm to over 400 acres, Mr. Nilson was also lending a hand to his neighbors helping with the care of sick animals. At the vocational school Charles had learned and studied about animals, as well as the phases of building. As time went on, and conditions became easier, Charles put up all new buildings on his farm and did practically all the work himself. He also planted many trees for windbreak and shade.

World War II came and Charles and Amelia's son Edwin enlisted. During the years of his service he contacted various illnessses that eventually led to a medical discharge. About two years afterwards Edwin died on December 21st, 1947 as a result of those illnesses. Another sadness came on September 18th, 1952 when Charles' dear wife died after having been ill

for many years.

After Amelia's death Charles gave up farming and worked as a carpenter for many years. For awhile he leased out the land of his farm and then eventually sold it to his daughter Marie and her husband, Roy Dahl, and he continued to live there alone. Later that year Charles decided he would take a

trip back to Sweden.

In December of 1962 Charles left for Alameda, California and on the 22nd he and his daughter Marie were on a jet plane. They left from Los Angeles on a Scandinavian Air Service flight and arrived in Copenhagen, Denmark just 11 hours later. From there they traveled by ferry over Helsingor to Halsingborg, Sweden and from there took an electric train to Laholm. This was the route Charles had taken when he left Hov in 1901 and he was anxious to see what changes had taken place over the years. It as 61 years and 8 months that had elapsed.

At Laholm Charles and Marie stayed with his sister and her husband. It was a beautiful time to visit as the Christmas decorations and other celebrations were so colorful. The early Christmas sunrise service at the church was most thrilling. The two huge Christmas trees in the front of the audience were lit with candles and as they burned out the service was over and no electric lights were turned on. The minister wore special robes that were colorful and beautifully jeweled, this was a high point of the visit. The next few days were used to travel around to see the old home place, the swimming hole, and visit

the church where Charles was confirmed and to visit his Mother's grave. On January 5th, 1963 the visit was over and before long "Welcome Home" was extended Charles as he came

through customs at New York.

On June 14th, 1975 Charles celebrated a belated 90th birthday. Charles now lives at the Good Samaritan Center in East Grand Forks. He continues to enjoy reading and does quite well without wearing his glasses. Submitted by Marie (Mrs. Roy W.) Dahl

A. G. Peterson

Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Peterson came from Sweden in the fall of the year 1882. They came to Vega Township and stayed with a family there named Eric Hogberg, in a 12 x 16 building. There were eleven people including children that lived in that one room house until Petersons got a log house built. Mr. Peterson and family stayed in Vega then for 16 years. In 1898 they moved to New Maine Township, Section 31 onto their daughter's homestead. They had one building they called the Frank Johnson Shanty. This was their school which they attended only a few days a year. Of course there were no roads, just wagon trails with only oxen to use in the fields and also to pull their sleighs and wagons.

They did their trading with Korstad who had a store out where Oscar Rokke lives at present. Another trading place was D. B. Bakke who was south of Newfolden. There they would bring in butter and eggs and trade for other necessities.

Some of the others living around there at the time were Pete Julin, Andrew Bakke, Carl Larson, Andrew Bring, Emil Larson and Ole Berg. Of their twelve children Henning was probably the most well known as he was the blacksmith in Newfolden for many years. Henning Peterson married Lena Williamson and they had two daughters, Gladys, Mrs. Ted Eide of Arizona and Pearl, Mrs. Gordon Elseth of Newfolden. Submitted by Mrs. Gordon Elseth

At first they drove oxen to do their farm work and to grub trees with to clear land.

Selling cordwood was a part of their income.

Newfolden. He and Pat have two children, a daughter Natalie and a son Jeffrey.


Marlene, their only daughter, is married to James Taggert. They live in New Maine Township also. They have three children, Troy, Melissa and Jennifer.

Opdahl Post Office

Established May 18, 1900, Discontinued January 31, 1914
The first year or so Sam Swenson was the postmaster located in Section 19, New Maine Township. After that Helvig Knutson (Kittell Knutson Home was the postmistress located in their home in Section 20, New Maine Township. This home was moved closer to the road and Chester Nelson lived here. The house is still located there.

School History

The first school board meeting was held Feb.15, 1902. Sam Swenson was the moderator. Knud K. Knudson was elected Director. (Knud was an Uncle to Nels C. and Chester Nelson). Fred Gibson was elected Treasurer, Olaf B. Hanson was elected Clerk. The meeting was held at the Iver Nelson residence.

Motions were made and seconded to discuss building two school houses in District #100 by making a loan from the State of Minnesota. for such purposes. Next were the appointments made for the places of said school grounds. The North School location would be in the center of section 8-157-44. For the South School location it was agreed on the NW1/4 of SW corner of Section 29-157-44.

The next meeting was held Feb.27, 1902 at the Iver Nelson residence. Knud K. Knudson was the moderator. It was decided to rent a house to serve as a school house for the first term. They would have four months of school. School would commence March 17, 1902. Knud K. Knudson shall tend to the renting of a School room in the South Half of District 100 and O.B. Hanson shall tend to the rent of a school room in the North Half of the District. They would pay \$6.00 for the rent of a school room for the school term.

Knud Knudsons, parents, Kittel Knudsons rented a room to the teacher for many years. The teacher would be paid. \$126.00 for the term or \$30.00 per month. Parents must furnish seats for the School and also books for their children. The Board of Trustees should hire a teacher and her wages be paid by Order on the District.

A Special Meeting was held June 5, 1902 at the Opdal Post Office which was at the Kittel Knudson home. Motions were made to change the location of the South School. Three different locations were voted on. The center of Sec.29 one square acre on the NW corner of the SE quarter. of Section.29 got 6 votes, the SW corner of the SE ¼ of Section 20 received 13 votes, and the NW corner of the SW quarter. of Section29 received 3 votes. 22 votes were cast. The meeting was adjourned.

Special Meetings were held again because the location voted on was too wet for the South School. It was finally agreed to have the School located on the SE corner of the NE quarter of the NW quarter of Section 29.

The third annual meeting was held August I, 1903 at the O.B. Hanson residence. The teachers wages shall not exceed \$35.00 a month. Knut K. Knutson will rent a room for the school in the South half of the District and O. B. Hanson for the North Half of the District with rent of a room for \$2.50.

The fourth annual meeting was held July 16, 1904. There were 23 voters present. Dist.# 100 made an application to the State of Minnesota. for a loan of \$1,000.00 to erect two school houses in the District. Bonds would be issued and the first one would be due three years from the date and the interest be paid at 4% per year. The payments would be \$100.00 per year for 10 years. N.M. Bacher, Ole Haug and Ole A. Berg were to attend to the wood for fuel for the school for one year. Mr. Godfrey E. Gibson resigned as Treasurer in 1904. Olaf Hanson was the Clerk and Knute K. Knudson as Director.

March 27, 1905 the school meeting was held at the Knute K. Knudson residence. The Board of Trustees of District #100 issued Bonds to the permanent school fund of State of Minnesota for \$1000. Interest at 4% per year payable to the Treasurer of the State of Minnesota. The first Bond of \$100.00 issued March 27, 1905 would be payable July 1, 1910. \$100.00 would be due every year until the year 1919. The rent of a room was raised to \$13.50, improving grounds \$3.00, wood for fuel \$13.50 and teachers wages \$386.88 for the year.

June 17, 1905 the meeting was held at Jacob Sjogren residence on Section 18. Christ Olson and A. Sundbergs bids to build the two school houses for \$130.00 and Jorgen Windahls bid for \$60.00 to haul lumber and stones were accepted. Lumber was purchased from Kittel Knuteson.

Aug.22, 1905 the meeting was held at the O.B. Hanson residence. It was decided that the school house would be 24x18x10 ft. to the plate. There would be 6 pair of windows, one door, a double floor, double outside wall with felt. On the inside there would be back plastering and sealing. It must have a stone foundation one foot high and also a brick pipe. The school had one large room with the small addition. Part of this addition was for hanging the coats in and also the water cooler sat on a small stand where the students could wash their hands. The other part was a small library. The teachers desk was near the South entrance with the desks on the North end of the building. The large windows on both the East and West sides made the school well lighted. The blackboards were on the north and south sides of the room. There was also an organ in the southeast corner of the large room. A large pot bellied stove was near the northeast corner of the school, surrounded by a metal jacket for heat circulation. The fuel used was wood. There was a good-sized wood shed full of wood. The students would help carry in wood for the day. In the later years Mrs. Charles Nelson was the janitor of the District #140 school.

Early purchases were a dictionary for \$4.50, text and library books, erasers, one box expressions and one box crayons purchased Dec.1906. Bookcases, four chairs from the Hoberg and Erickson Store in Newfolden for \$3.60, window shades for \$1.20 from the Ole Kleppe store in Newfolden and a flag for 80 cents. A fountain was purchased in 1918 for \$7.50.

Scholars enrolled in 1906 were 28. Ages five to eight years of age were 3 pupils, Ages 8 to 16 years were 27 pupils, and 16 to 21 years were 2 students.

Aug. 17, 1907 Turi Haug was paid \$1.00 for one acres of land for a school house site.

In 1908 additions were built on to each of the schools in District 100. The size was 18 x 10 x 8.

New Maine Township had three Rural Schools at one time. There were two schools in District #100, a North School and a South School. In later years the South School was District #140 and named the Goodwill School. There was also a District #104 which was first located about a mile North of the John Lee home in 1909 in Section 23 and was close to where Stuart Sethres own land now. Later District #104 was located in Section two and was called the Taylor School. This was east of the Charles Taylor home where Leonard Benke lives now.

The District #140 school, also called the Charley Nelson school, because it was located in his pasture, was moved across the road to the North of the Nelson farm in Section 20 in 1941. This is where the New Maine Town Hall is located now. Before the children were all so afraid of the cattle and horses so they decided to move the school to a new location. At one of the Board Meetings a motion was made to put a fence around the school but there was no second so nothing was done. Lucille Hetland was the last teacher to teach at District #140 before it was moved. The location in the southwest quarter, of Section 20 was first homesteaded by Halvor Nelson in the late 1800s. His daughter, Helen was born there in 1898 and his son, Nels C. Nelson was born May 20, 1900 on this land. Halvor Nelsons and Anton Borgens moved away from New Maine in 1902 but Halvor returned in 1927 and lived there until his death. In 1902 he sold his 160 acres for \$1,100.00. Halvor was a great grandfather to Barry Nelson, present board member and also to Harold Lee. Mrs. Harold Lee (Diane) is also a Board member of Halvor was Pondmaster when the township first organized. Donald Larson, another Board Member, was a great grandson to Jacob Sjogren who was Treasurer of the School Board in early years. Knute K. Knutson was a great, great Uncle to Barry Nelson and Harold Lee. Jacob Sjogren was also the librarian in 1908. The library was open once every two weeks so books could be taken out to read.

In early years the age range of students was from five to 20 years. The school term was five to seven months. In later years the term was nine months. In early years attendance was poor because many of the students had to stay at home and help.

Games played during recess were Farmer in the Dell, Fox and Geese, Last Couple Out, Drop the Handkerchief, London Bridges, anti-over, (the wood shed was used for this game), baseball and other games.

Plays and readings were given at our Christmas programs. We spent some time practicing for these programs which the parents always came to. Apples were given to every one who came.

For Valentines Day the students all helped make one large Valentine box and we had a Valentine party.

Students helped clean the erasers, they carried in water from the old pump outside, raised and lowered the flag from the flag pole every day, and carried in wood.

On the last day of school, a picnic was held. The parents would come to this too.

I remember my mother, Bertina Nelson, telling about the year she walked to the school on the last day of school. We lived in the SW quarter. of Section 28 so she had a long way to walk. My Dad was out working so he wasn't home. Mom brought a cake to the picnic. So she carried that in one hand, carried my sister, Marian, who was 10 months old, and Joan, who was only two and half years old, had to walk along too. The two older children, Marvin and Deloris were expecting them to be there for the picnic.

After the District 140, Goodwill School, was moved in 1941, they held school for only one term, 1941-1942. Judith Melin was the teacher. There was a shortage of teachers so the students were sent to the Newfolden School for three years, (1942-1943, 1943-1944, 1944-1945). In the fall of 1945 school was held again in New Maine. Miss Bonita Nyflot taught in 1945-1946. Mrs. Frances Cook taught for the next two years, (1946-1947) and (1947-1948). She lived in Newfolden. Her husband was the Postmaster. She drove to school every day. Mrs. Carl, (Gladys), Johnson taught in 1948 –1949. JoAnn Benitt taught school in 1949-1950, and also in 1950-1951. She married Donald

Larson during her last year of teaching there. 1950-1951 was the last year school was held in the rural school in New Maine. All the students went by bus to Newfolden the years after. Later this school was named the New Maine Town Hall.

In 1948 there were 13 boys and 9 girls in District #140 school. The teacher was paid \$180.00 a month in wages. In 1949 there were 9 boys and 10 girls. The teacher's wages were \$200.00 a month. In 1951 there were 7 boys and 6 girls. The teacher's wages were \$200.00 a month.

Bible School was held at this school every summer for a week or two. The teachers I remember were Iola Fisher, Bernice Anderson, Marjorie Solem and Muriel Nelson.

When the New Maine 4 H was organized, they held all their meetings in the school house at first.

In the early years, Fred Waterworth did some shingle work on the school. In 1998 the school was reshingled by Tom Blazjewski and Jeremy Nelson. Charles. Nilson did carpentry work also. He made the cement steps.

The New Maine Schools carried insurance with the Marshall County Mutual Insurance Company ever since the schools were built. This company celebrated 100 years this year also. In 1902 the early settlers of New Maine who carried Insurance with this company were O.B.Hanson, John Johnson, Ole Skadsem, Mrs. Turi Haugen, Ole Haug, Knute and Kittel Knutsen, C.C. Peterson, John L. Johns, John Dufke, and Jacob Sjogren.

Many of the teachers stayed at the Helvig and Kittel Knutson Home. From 1923 to 1926, Selma Shefvelin (Mrs. Ben Fisher) boarded here. Some of the students in her class were Helge Lindquist, Oscar Johnson, Della Johnson (Mrs. Gunner Lindquist and others.

Blackberg School

My family, Ben and Inga Bengtson, Bernice, Darleen, Len and Arnie, moved to New Maine township in the fall of 1929. This is as near as my sister, Bernice Ueland, and I, Darlene Chapman, can figure out.

We lived on what was known as the Amundson and Lee farm. Our brothers Vernon and Lloyd were born while we lived at the Amundson and Lee place.

In more recent years, Wayne Ulferts, who was a teacher and coach in Newfolden some years ago, owned or rented the place.

There were no classes at the Blackberg School in 1929. The Blackberg school in school district 100 opened or re-opened in 1930, I believe.

Bernice stayed with our grandpa and grandma Bjorgaard near Argyle to go to school that first year. She completed first grade there.

When the Blackberg School opened in 1930, I began first grade that year and Bernice was in second grade. Brothers Len and Arnie started school there a few eyars later.

Freda Blackberg was my teacher first through seventh grade. She was a very good teacher. She taught us the three "R's" plus some history, geography, citizenship, art and phy-ed. Freda taught all eight grades in one classroom.

There was a big pot bellied wood stove for heat. We even had a hot lunch program. We brought food in containers that could be heated on the top of that stove!

Freda wrote meaningful little sayings on the blackboard in beautiful colored chalk. Things like: "Do to others as you would have them do to you" and "The only way to have a friend is to be one."

Freda always read a chapter of a book to us after noon recess. I believe that is one reason so many of her pupils love to read to this day. The teacher was also the librarian and had to keep track of all the books. We also had spelling bees.

We had programs for all the holidays, socials and a last day of school picnic. We had what was called a "Play Day" when all the schools in the area got together for competitive sports.

I have a picture of some of the pupils of the Blackberg School with our teacher Freda Blackberg.

The children from what was called the Taylor School were bussed to the Blackberg School. That must have been on e of the first school buses at least in this part of the country. Ted Tunheim drove the bus.

In 1936 Mother and Dad bought the place where Lloyd and Leanna Bengtson live now. I went to school at what was known as the Charley Nelson School also. I began eight grade there in the fall of 1936. The Charley Nelson School is now known as the New Maine Town Hall.

Len, Arnie and Vernon all went to school in the Charlie Nelson School. Gladys Eide was the teacher. Len finished eighth grade there. Vernon began first grade at the Charley Nelson School. Arnie and Vernon went to school there for a few eyars, then finished in Newfolden. Lloyd began first grade in Newfolden and finished his schooling there.

The three Smith children, in the picture were related to the Wikstroms. Their mother was a sister of George Wikstrom (who started the Wikstrom Telephone Company). The Wikstrom family lived near Strandquist and the Smith children were living with them at the time that they went to the Blackberg school because their mother was sick and their grandparents were taking care of them. The Wikstroms brought them to school every day.

Gordon Borsvald's mother was also a Wikstrom. I'm not sure where the Borsvalds lived but Gordon used to ride to school with the Wikstroms.

Myron Eggie's mother was Freda Blackberg's sister. He stayed with the Blackberg family for one year and he went to the Blackberg school too during that time.

Except for these I mentioned I think the others lived in New Maine.

Opdahl Cemetery - New Maine

The only cemetery in New Maine is located in the NE1//4 of Section 17. Stener Blinsmon lived here and he gave a corner of his land for the cemetery. Stener was a great grandfather to Barry Nelson.

The cemetery was named after the place in Norway where many of the settlers came from - Opdaal, Numedal, Norway.

The first grave was the Anton Borgen baby girl, Clara Borgen, three weeks old. The Borgens left New Maine Township in 1902 along with the Halvor Nelson family. Anton Borgen was a grandfather to Ernest Nelson.

We were told that the first grave in the cemetery before it was bought from Steiner was Mrs. Kittle Lillegard. There were ten more buried there before it was officially bought from Stener.

The Opdahl Cemetery was pretty much a forgotten cemetery until 1968 when Hannah Larson got the idea to write letters to the people who had relatives buried there. With the help of Oscar and Nellie Skadsem and others. Then they had about three or four bake sales to raise money to put a fence around it. Then a group of neighbors and relatives mowed and keep the cemetery looking nice. Later on we hired some help. Orville Skadsem, Andy and Josh Larson do the mowing now.

Note: Donald Larson and Barry Nelson and Mrs. Harold Lee (all New Maine Board members) had relatives in this band.

The Hartvig Hanson family were very musical. Alson Burnelle Nelson from the Halvor Nelson family. The older Hansons were Carl, John and Ernest.

The Tunheim family were also musical plus I'm sure many others I've forgotten.

Mr Sandberg also visited with Ted and Gladys Anderson (who had recently moved to New Maine). He wanted them to help with starting a 4-H Club here because they had been involved with a 4-H Club near Stephen before moving here. Most of the rest of us had never been in 4-H and knew little about how to get a club stated.

Anyway, most of the people around here seemed interested, so a meeting was called to organize a 4-H Club. Mrs. Ted Anderson consented to be our first Key Leader; Arnold Larson, Ray Chapman and Bernice Ueland were chosen to help her as Assistant Leaders. Marlene Ueland was the first president of the club (but I can't remember who the other officers were).

Everybody "dug in" and helped and we had a great time getting the club going. We decided to call it the New Maine 4-H Club. The club still goes by that name even though they now meet at the Newfolden Community Center and the larger percent of the members no longer live in New Maine. I am proud that we had a part in getting this club started. Today it is one of the largest clubs in Marshall County. Many of the members earn trips to the state fair every and do well there also.

The following are notes from the club secretary's report. The second year would have been in 1962. "We have now finished our second as a 4-H Club. We now have an enrollment of 24 which is five more this year. The one's joining this year are Sybill Larson, William Engen, Dean Anderson, Ricky Ellingson and DeVere Chapman. Our officers this year are President - Merlin Anderson, Vice President - DeVere Chapman, Treasurer - Donald Larson, Reporter - Shirley Lokstad, and Secretary - Cathy Moen. One member of our club participated in the Radio Speaking Contest. She was Helen Mattson. She placed third in the contest. For 4-H Week, our club put up a display in the Newfolden Fairway Store. In February we planned and decided to put on a play. In April we had a bake and rummage sale to raise money for our trip to Morden, Canada. Our sale was a success! We took in \$59.00. In March and April we were busy practicing for our play, "Pig of My Dreams." The members of the cast were: Eldor Engen, Jr., Jonie Gillund, Shirley Lokstad, Cathie Moen and Merlin Anderson. The directors of the play were: DeVere Chapman, Mrs. Ueland and Mrs. Ted Anderson. The student manger was Marlene Ueland, with the other 4-H members as helpers. We took second place at the sub-final contest. We had four acts in the Share the Fun Contest. The Gillund girls a song, Leola Chapman and Beverly Mattson - a song, Shirley Lokstad - a trumpet solo and a musical skit by DeVere Chapman, Ricky Ellingson and Merlin Anderson. Two acts went on to county finals. Shirley's trumpet solo and the musical skit by DeVere, Ricky and Merlin. We are very proud of their "Darky Act" which came out second in the county. Our 4-H club did well in softball this year. We came in second losing to the winning team by only one point at the county 4-H picnic. Our club brought twenty entries to the fair this year with eleven members taking part.

"I remember walking to the barn in the evening, using a lantern. We did not have electricity until 1949, I believe. We had a large clear kerosene lamp in the kitchen, where the light was the brightest.

In the late 50s, we got an oil furnace. Dad stood over one of the blowers, and was as happy as I had ever seen him. He had spent all his life getting up at night to feed the wood stove, and chopping it for the next year. Now, as an older man, he could rest a bit and be so warm.

After the wood stoves were stoked up in the morning, Dad (& Mom) went out to milk the cows. They brought the milk into the kitchen in the milk pails. They poured the milk into the separator, and started turning the handle. The cream came

out the small spout, the milk came out the larger spout. The separator was washed thoroughly, and put back together.

Meanwhile, the woodstove in the kitchen was pretty warm, and we kids were up, huddling next to the stove to warm up. The reservoir for water was also quite warm. Oatmeal was cooking. The cream was brought into the creamery in town, located near the bridge on the west side of town.

One morning a car came screaming into our driveway. Taylor's barn was burning, and our house was the closest house with a telephone. Quickly the handle was turned one long for the operator, who then got the fire department. It was too late, but we tried.

Anytime we wanted to call our neighbors, we would have to call the number of rings that was theirs. It was a party line, so your business was personal, only if you did not hear anyone else on the party line pick up the line. Our number was two long.

Birthdays were special. John, Otelia, and Ingvard Lokstad would be there on THE date of the birthday. The weather wasn't much of an issue, after all, they were northern Minnesotans, whose parents came south (from north of the Arctic Circle) to live there. There was always a gift and a cake or ice cream brought along.

Ice cream was a treat. For birthdays John brought a half gallon. On rare occasions, Dad would buy a pint, and we would slice it into 5 slices, right away, as we did not always have a refrigerator. Other real treats were a can of pork and beans with a package of hot dogs (2 hotdogs each), or white bread with butter and summer sausage. We put the butter in the windowsill to keep it cool, and the watermelon would go in the basement, if some were left over. Frozen foods could be kept outside in the winter, of course.

Social occasions for the women would be 'visiting' in the afternoon over coffee. Just show up, and there would always be coffee, and cake and/or cookies. Dad would drive into town most morning, and have coffee."

"Two things I remember about 4-H is when Janice Olson and I sang "Lazy Bones" dressed up in hillbilly-like clothes - I think in the gym in Middle River. Then we also practiced softball at Ueland's mostly and Ronnie Ueland was our coach. He made it fun and we learned a lot from him. It gave me confidence to play again in a Dairyland Power ball team in Wadena in 1967 or 68 and I dared to pitch and play first base, probably because of what I learned from Ronnie.

I remember Vernice Larson – she was a good motivator and a lot of fun, as was Bernice Ueland and Gladys Anderson. We also played softball over at Andersons. Those are some of the best times in my life. It was fun for our family and the Sathers. I think part of this really made us kids good friends. My granddaughters are in 4-H in Westby, Wisconsin and have been in contests raising pigs and making pictures, etc."

Oliver Lokstad

Oliver, also a brother to Hans, owned the land in Section 27 which was later purchased by Ted and Mabel Tunheim. Oliver spent many years in Idaho after he left New Maine.

Glen Magner Family

This was written by Joyce Magner and read by Cindy Borg for Glen and Agnes' fiftieth wedding anniversary.

In the spring a young man's fancy turns to love, and that's just what happened on March 28, 1928 when Glen Magner asked Agnes Skadsem to be his bride. I am so glad it all turned out to be – or I wouldn't be here the oldest granddaughter on the family tree.

They traveled to Ray, Colorado - Oh! Agnes thought Glen was quite the fellow!

From there to Hoople, North Dakota they did go – to work on the Ginter's land – Agnes as cook and Glen as hired man.

It was there the first son was born - they named him Cecil LaVern. Now they both had lots of thing to learn --- and learn fast they had to do for two years later Orlin Harold joined the crew.

Before he was born to her folks in Minnesota Agnes did go – for to have the baby at home she'd do if she could – after all the doctor charged only two cords of wood.

Then back to Hoople and the Knute Aaland and Folson farms – Agnes recalls moving 13 time in one year. Hoople was a very productive land in more ways than one, for two years later they had another son. Gaylord became his name.

That fall they decided to Minnesota they would move and settled in New Maine Township. The money was scarce and the house wasn't the best – and I'm sure with three active boys there wasn't much rest.

In 1934 again there came a knocking on the Magner door – finally a baby girl! They called her Beatrice Sylvia LaBelle – she was named after a flour, the kind you eat and not the kind you smell.

Glen worked on the railroad and for the WPA – helped to build the gym on the old school – where the little kids play.

Donald Lloyd was born in December of 1936 - a chubby little fellow who was always full of tricks.

He was joined in 1941 by another, Gene Roger. The total was now five boys, but only one daughter.

The kids only wore shoes during the very coldest weather, it's no wonder their feet became as tough as leather.

The children their own toys they did make. Remember the time they almost burned poor Donny at the stake. A teepee they had made in the woods and were having fun roasting ma's chickens - - Oh my they sure were full of the dickens!

Roping and riding the calves was another good sport and it seems like someone was always building a fort. They always found something interesting to play – especially when the Olson boys (Kenny & Keith) came to stay.

On Saturday night you'd often see them go to town to the picture show. It was always a big treat when the Melo boys set up their motion pictures on the street. Bud Abbott and Lou Costella were famous at the time as were the Hardy Boys and Andy Divine.

Last, but not least, Opal was born in 1946. She was so cute with cheeks like a rose and one or two freckles on her nose.

Agnes has always been good to cook and bake – especially her chocolate cake. Her potato dumplings are everyone's favorite dish, and if invited for dinner you sure hate to miss.

Glen loves to hunt the fox and deer and of the woods he has no fear. His dogs he keeps close to the road for everyone to see – they sure aren't much to look at if you ask me.

Agnes has made pancakes every morning for Glen – you'd think he'd like something different now and then. In doing a little calculating I find by eating an average of two pancakes a day for fifty years, that's a total of 36,500 pancakes. And that's a lot of dough.

Halvor sold his land in New Maine Township for \$1,100.00 on June 13, 1902. they moved to Rainy, Canada, then to Pitt, MN until 1914. This is where he went to school. They also lived at Alamo and Meckinock, ND and Clearbrook, MN. They moved back to New Maine Township in 1927. He married Bertina Strand, daughter of Anton and Lena Strand of Grafton, ND on September 24, 1927 by Rev. G.P. Ronholm. He had met her when he worked on farms by Grafton. This move meant the end of formalized schooling for 15 year old Lucille.

Art Skadsem was born in 1912, the fourth child to Ole and Sophie Skadsem in New Maine township. Art and Lucille were married June 29, 1937 and purchased her parents farm in 1945. They raised six children on the farm before moving to Newfolden in 1978. Art always said if the crops had been as plentiful as kids he could have had many a bumper crop.

A Big, big memory was getting electricity sometime in the late 40's. Picking blueberries in the swamp was a great activity some summers. Usually just ate them, but sometimes sold a few. Mom could never come look for us as she would get poison ivy. Riding horse and having a raccoon for a pet filled many a summer day. As a family, we spent time visiting with our neighbors, usually John and Kate Taylor. In bad weather the kids would play hide the thimble and in nice weather we would play kick the can. Our parents would play cards.

Our eyes were made aware of the world outside of New Maine when a weather balloon fell in a swamp hayfield close to our farm. We used many yards of the plastic for many projects after that event. The only time I remember being afraid was when a bear killed some of our sheep. Many people helped hunt it down including an airplane. High tech stuff for the 50s. I left in 1962 and we still did not have a phone.

Newfolden gave brides to three of Lucille's brothers – all of the brides were related to her husband, Art. Brother Glen married Art's sister Agnes, brother Dale married Art's cousin Jeanette Blinsmon and brother Gaylord married his niece Lucile Lee Becklund.

In 1937 they purchased 80 acres in New Maine Township from Sam Lee. It had been State land, unimproved and very dense forest. Trees were cleared and a one room log house was erected. By then Alfreda and Viola had joined the family. In 1938, one more room was added to the house in time to welcome another baby girl, Myrtle. Willis

was born in 1941. In 1947, Oscar started building the house that still stands on the farm, from mostly home sawed lumber.

The Blackberg country school was a little more than two miles northwest of the farm. Doris, Orville, Norris and Alfreda attended school there. The kids all grew up and went their separate ways. Oscar and Nellie continued to live on the farm, raising hay, small grain and sheep until 1980. Poor health made a move to town necessary.

Orville bought the farm, so it still remains in the family. Oscar died in December, 1983 at age 76. Nellie died in February, 1997 at age 87. They are survived by six children (Norris died January 1993). Twenty four grandchildren, fifty great grandchildren and eleven great-great grandchildren.

By today's standards it's hard to imagine growing up in this setting. But we were raised in a Christian home filled with love and music. We were and are a very close knit family and we treasure all of our memories.

Lived in Section 27. They purchased their land from Oliver Lokstad. Ted died in 1957 after which Mabel moved to Warren and continues to live there.


Fred J. Waterworth Family





Orlin, the second oldest son of Glen and Agnes (Skadsem) Magner was born in a log house on August, 1930. the family had seven children, Cecil, Orlin, Gaylord, Beatrice, Donald, Gene and Opal. They are all living with exception of Cecil who was killed during the Korean Conflice in 1952. Glen and Agnes continued to live in New Maine Township until their deaths in 1986.

We always walked the one and one half miles to school. When we went to town in the winter we take a team of horses and a sleigh with a cab which contained a wood stove to keep us warm. We went through the woods to town. One time we were crossing the railroad tracks and Dad asked if any trains were coming. It was hard to see out of the frosted windows and usually there were none coming so we all said no. We were wrong and barely missed the train. We always took a cord of wood to town to sell to school in Newfolden or Amundson Lee store. We would get \$3.00 for the wood which was enough to buy our groceries.

Besides attending school at the now "New Maine Town Hall" we also went to Vacation Bible School there. I remember having races during play time and how Betty Nelson Swaan beat me running to the railroad tracks. I think Betty would still beat me today.

I joined the Army in 1952 serving for two years. I married Joyce Sorum on June 7, 1952 and for the past forty-one years have made our home in Newfolden. We have four children, Cindy married to Gary Borg, living in New Maine Township on the former Tollef Nelson farm; Danny married to Shirley Verbout, living in New Maine Township on a farm purchased from Wesley Staie; Scott married to Tammie Halvorson, living in New Folden Township on land previously owned by grandparents, Willie and Mabel Sorum; Brent married to Kelly Johnson, living in Marsh Grove Township on the old Nyflot farm. We also have been blessed with 13 grandchildren and two great-granddaughters.

We purchased eighty acres of land in section five, New Maine Township from Jhalmer and Bertha Blackberg in May, 1977. We use the land mainly for hunting with the exception of Don Larson renting part for hay. Stuart & Joan Sethre - "Whispering Oaks"

Sethre's hunting/refuge in section 23 of New Maine township has a State Auditors Certificate dated June 6, 1900 and prior to that, Northern Pacific Railroad owned it after it had been conveyed to the State of Minnesota, dated March 10, 1888.

The land was sold to private owners starting in 1905 to an H. C. Hjerleid and later to Martin Martens. Early ditch assessments are dated October 10, 1910 to Hans E. Myhre, a prominent businessman/banker in Newfolden. H.E. Myhre built several homes in Newfolden and perhaps needed the trees for lumber. Stener Blinsmon acquired the land in 1924 and Oscar Blinsman received title to it in 1942. Fernard Miller's were the next owners in 1960 and in 1970 sold it to Try and Aquila Burch. The W. S. Sethre family bought the land in 1984, built a cabin and a donut shaped pond for wildlife. The site where the cabin is built is just west of the Blinsmon home (some of the foundation is there). Signs of cabins about three blocks west and three blocks north and east of the site can still be seen. Lilac bushes still grow three blocks west and part of the foundation is still evident at the northeast site. Edward Nelsons lived up there as did Avon Nelsons for

a time. Nels X. Nelson used to tell of haying the swamp south and east of our cabin. The Donovan Folden family have their cabin on the northeast site.

The land flourishes with oaks, evergreens, tamaracks, popplers, willows, berry trees, hazelnuts, etc. We see geese, ducks and sand hill cranes on the pond. We also see moose, bear, bobcats and even a porcupine. We feed deer in the winter and have counted up to 80 deer in the yard at one time.

We have a very good map of our area that helped the DNR find a little two year girl who had wandered away from her grandparent's place. She was found about four hours after she was lost on one of our trails, not too farm from a swamp.

Our land is located five miles from Newfolden on a tar road, then a county gravel road, a township gravel road to a trail with no ditches and deer trails interspersed.
